- Whether facing wage stagnation, struggling to find job opportunities, or figuring how to pay for basic living necessities, many Americans are hurting economically – particularly women, younger voters, and people of color.
- Consequently, voters broadly support funding government services to help provide basic living standards.
- Voters overwhelmingly see public education and access to clean water as fundamental human rights that should be guaranteed by government, and to a lesser degree food and housing. Childcare and broadband access are seen as important, but less essential as government ensured rights.

- Voters widely support the federal government stepping in to ensure state governments can continue to provide aid in face of the pandemic.
- Infrastructure investment, paid sick days & paid family leave, and food & housing assistance are widely popular proposals to strengthen our economy, across partisan lines. But even weakest proposals garner majority support.
- Framing the pandemic as disproportionately affecting those in poverty drives more voters to back big changes than does a framing based on race.




Thinking back to one year ago, how would you rate your current personal economic situation compared to before the coronavirus pandemic?

Darker shade = Stronger intensity


Income vs. Cost Of Living

Do you think your family's income is going up faster than the cost of living, staying about even with the cost of living, or falling behind the cost of living?






Women Are More Likely To Feel Left Behind




Nearly Half Of Voters Are Experiencing Economic Difficulties Finding A Job Or Paying For Basic Needs

% Experience at least one economic challenge in their family




Over Half Facing Economic Challenges Identify The Pandemic As The Primary Cause


Cause: Self




4-in-10 Currently Receiving Or Know Family Receiving Assistance, Including Over Half Of Black Voters And Voters Under 35






Strong Majority Believes People Are Poor Because Of Circumstances Beyond Their Control


- Most people who live in poverty are poor because their jobs don't pay enough, they lack good health care and education, and things cost too much for them to save and move ahead.

- I don't envision ever being in a position where I would need or want to use the health care, nutrition, housing, or income support provided by the government.






Voters Prioritize Government Assistance Over Spending Cuts – Even Half Of Republicans

- It is more important to me that the government address large budget deficits by reducing overall spending on government assistance programs for lowincome people.




Dependency Fears Deter Many Republicans From Supporting Government Assistance

- Welfare programs trap people in poverty by leaving them dependent on the government and penalizing work.



Voters Broadly Support The Federal Government Stepping In To Ensure Support From State Governments In Face Of Pandemic

- With state budgets crushed by the pandemic, the federal government should step in and directly provide aid to help struggling families keep their homes, put food on the table, and otherwise make ends meet.
- State governments must tighten their spending in the face of this pandemic, even if it temporarily reduces benefits for the unemployed and those who rely on government programs. The federal government should not bail states out during this pandemic.




Majorities See A Clear Role For Government In Guaranteeing Clean Water, Education, And Nutrition




Voters Believe That Economic Inequality Is More Prevalent Than Racial Inequality When It Comes To The Impact Of COVID





(Split) Increase the total amount of housing assistance offered to low-income families and include all families facing unaffordable housing costs.	26		65
